KIRKHILL TOTS

Kirkhill Tots Group meet every Wednesday in the Community Centre from 10 a.m. to 12 noon. We take a break for the school holidays. Mums, Dads, and other carers are welcome with their little ones ~ we currently have up to 15 children from the ages of newborn to three, with older children able to come along when Nursery finishes at half-past eleven.

The atmosphere is very relaxed \sim two volunteers set out the toys and the snacks and the rest watch their children play, with a cup of tea or coffee. Our fees are set very low, at £1 a week or £1.50 per family. Nursery age children do not pay because they are not here for the full session. We also have an annual registration fee, £5, which helps cover improvements, rent, trips and the fun days at the end of every term.

We did really well with our fundraising, raising enough from the Christmas Raffle and other efforts to buy all the new mats and toys we need this year. Thank you everyone for supporting us and I hope you will continue to support us in future efforts. HORSE RIDERS AND THE ROAD

Kirkhill is a beautiful rural area enjoyed by many horse riders; in fact within our small community we can boast a world class international endurance rider, Liz Booth who has represented Britain abroad, no mean feat by any standards. In November 2003 two "local girls" Louise Anderson and Mary MacArthur took part in a charity challenge, a cattle drive on horseback in Patagonia, South America having raised thousands of pounds for charity. Both have been involved with charity fund raising with horse events in the past.

However, there has been some confusion from both drivers and horse riders about the rules of the road regarding horse riders. The Highway Code clearly states that cars must slow down, pass wide and heed any signals given by horse riders. Horses can be startled by a simple thing such as a polythene bag blowing on a fence or a bird suddenly flying up, yet some drivers drive past at high speed without any regard for the safety of the horse and rider. Most riders have to ride two abreast to slow down the traffic for their own safety otherwise they risk being mowed down by speeding drivers who pass very closely when there is an oncoming car. Any hazard in the country, be it children on bikes, farm animals and wildlife or horse riders should be treated with great caution. Please remember Kirkhill is not part of the city. Please treat our countryside and those enjoying it with care. We horse riders always acknowledge with a nod or wave to the courteous careful drivers who pass us carefully many thanks to them, it is greatly appreciated.

Harmony is the key for Kirkhill for country lovers to enjoy the beautiful setting and for commuters to take care of their home area yet be near to the city.
